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

This is the true meaning of timelessness to me. Times and fashions may change, but beauty and quality never go out of style.



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## LESSONS FROM THE PAST, PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Humbertown Jewellers is opening a bright new chapter while honouring its family legacy



Change is in the air at Humbertown Jewellers. An extensive renovation scheduled to be completed by 2026 will more than double the store's total footprint, allowing more room for watches and jewellery, and creating a more immersive customer experience. While the look of the store may change, however, Humbertown's commitment to quality products and personalized service will always come first. For owner Ferit Tecimer, there's simply no other way to do business.

"All my life I have been a big believer in quality," says Tecimer. "If you keep the quality high, then everything is good. Perhaps there are other ways of doing business where we could sell more merchandise, but I don't care about that. Our business is about making beautiful things, not just making a profit."

Ferit Tecimer credits this philosophy and his passion for the jewellery trade to his upbringing in a family of jewellers in Istanbul, Turkey. "I learned the business from my father, who learned from his father," he says. "He would take me to work with him in the morning and teach me how he did business. He always enjoyed his work." The Tecimers weren't in the watch business at that time because high-end watches still weren't widely available in Turkey, Ferit says. Instead, they specialized in gold filigree – a delicate and ornate style of jewellery that dates back hundreds of years to the ancient world. "Most of the jewellery they made was in 22 karat gold, and they were very nice pieces," Tecimer recalls. "Everything was done by hand in his workshops. It is very small and detailed work, and it's not easy to do."

From before the age of 10, Tecimer says, he learned the jewellery trade in his father's workshop, and by the time he was in university studying to be an architect he was already running his own small jewellery shop on the side. "The best advice I received from my father was 'quality and honesty," Tecimer says. "Those are the two most important things. If you don't have honesty as a jeweller, you won't get anywhere. But if people trust you, everything works from there."

When he emigrated to Canada in the early 1980s, Tecimer had two choices: continue to work as an architect, or return to his roots in the jewellery business. "I had two children, and in order to practice architecture I had to go to school again all the way from the beginning. So I chose jewellery," he says. Starting with a small 600-square-foot store, Tecimer sold 10K gold chains and entry-level watches, earning the trust of his customers and always paying close attention to the smallest details. "It's always been a priority to take the time to arrange a display case so that everything is perfect and looking nice," he says. "Everyone might not notice that but, for me, those kinds of details are very important."

Tecimer credits the steady growth of Humbertown Jewellers over the next four decades to the relationships he has built with his clients and their families, and the commitment to quality instilled in him from an early age. "Jewellery is not like other businesses, where you are always just thinking about how much money you're making. In this business, you have to love it," Tecimer explains. "Jewellery is





The classically inspired steel 4947/1A (hers) and white gold 5205G (his) both offer this unique complication with the added celestial opulence of a moon phase display.











#### CARTIER

The Santos de Cartier watch was originally designed in 1904 for Alberto Santos-Dumont, a pioneering aviator whose experimental flying machines changed the face of flying. Today's Santos watch styles are available in a wide array of modern models and make for a particularly high-flying choice, shown here in a blue PVD bezel (on him) or set with 206 brilliant-cut diamonds (on her).



#### JAEGER-LECOULTRE

If the glitter of 18k white gold and 166 diamonds set into the case, bezel, and crowns aren't mesmerizing enough, the Jaeger-LeCoultre Rendez-Vous Moon watch (hers) puts the cosmos on your wrist with an extra-large moon phase display set inside a miniature map of the stars. The Master Control Date (his) strikes a subtler but equally captivating note with a dial the colour of a twilight sky.







OMEGA

The world is yours, or, if you prefer, the sky. The Omega Seamaster Aqua Terra 150m Co-Axial Master Chronometer GMT Worldtimer (his) features a 24-hour glass ring surrounding a map of the Earth depicted on a grade 5 titanium plate, while the Constellation Co-Axial Master Chronometer (hers) places diamond hour markers around a speckled deep blue dial that evokes the night sky.









ULYSSE NARDIN

The unmistakable glow of mother-of-pearl proves the perfect contrast to the glimmer of diamond hour markers and a diamond-set bezel in the Ulysse Nardin Diver (hers). In the Blast Skeleton X (his), the mesmerizing swirl of a Carbonium case proves similarly complementary to an ethereal openworked dial.




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
## HUMBERTOWN SUPPORTS THE FIGHT TO END CANCER










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A team of scientists supported by National Geographic and Rolex assembles the world's highest weather station on Mt. Everest.

If the best way to see the stars is to get closer to them, there's no better place on Earth to enjoy the night sky than the slopes of Mount Everest, the highest point on Earth. Here, more than 8,000 metres above sea level, the majesty of the celestial world is on full display, unspoilt by light and air pollution, and seemingly close enough to touch. As part of a partnership going back nearly 75 years, Rolex and National Geographic are dedicated to protecting the land, air, water, and skies of our planet so that future generations may enjoy this otherworldly spectacle for many centuries to come.

Rolex has been a supporter of pioneering explorers since the 1930s, and Rolex Oyster Perpetual watches have been worn by those who have ventured to the highest mountain peaks and the deepest depths of the ocean. In 1954, Rolex cemented its commitment to exploration through an official partnership with the National Geographic Society and has since supported countless expeditions to the world's most remote corners. Over the last six decades, Rolex and National Geographic have been instrumental to historic achievements such as the 1960 Bathyscape *Trieste* expedition, which descended a record-breaking 10,916 metres below the surface of the Pacific Ocean, and Hollywood director James Cameron's 2012 solo dive to the bottom of the ocean aboard the Deepsea Challenger.

In 2017, in light of growing environmental crises from climate change to overfishing, Rolex and the National Geographic Society re-

defined their partnership to promote and prioritize exploration linked to the preservation of the planet. The first expedition supported by this new partnership was in 2019, led by National Geographic and Tribhuvan University, to study the effects of climate change on the glaciers of the Hindu Kush-Himalaya. In addition to the glaciers being part of some of the world's least-studied ecosystems, they are a critical source of water for more than one billion people living downstream. Over two months, the interdisciplinary team set up the two highest weather stations in the world, collected the highest-ever ice core sample, surveyed local biodiversity, and gathered new data on the history of the glaciers.

The Everest expedition was the first of many to come, each specifically intended to increase human knowledge about life on the planet and the threats facing it in the future. The wealth of information collected by the Everest team, along with data gathered by other Rolex-supported expeditions, will assist scientists around the world in studying the effects of climate change on critical resources like the glaciers of the Hindu Kush-Himalaya. These expeditions will also serve as beacons to inspire the next generation of scientists and conservationists to take up the challenge of working to protect life on our planet. As anyone fortunate enough to gaze up through the crisp, clean air of the Himalayas at the blanket of stars overhead will immediately understand, it's worth saving.

## ENDURING STYLE

The new OMEGA Constellation 36mm and Speedmaster Super Racing combine classic design with 21st-century precision



The new Omega Speedmaster Super Racing (above) and the Omega Constellation 36mm (right) bring 21st-century movements and stylish new aesthetics to a pair of classic 20th-century designs.

Designing a watch is a deceptively simple process. After all, what more do you need than a case, a dial, some hands, and a movement? As anyone with an interest in watches knows, however, there is an entire universe of possibility in the details and — with the right mix of inspiration, innovation, and skill — the opportunity to create something truly timeless. The new Omega Speedmaster Super Racing and the Omega Constellation 36mm collection reimagine a pair of celebrated designs for the 21st century and prove just how enduring such designs can be.

Since its release in 1957, the Omega Speedmaster has been one of the world's favourite chronographs. Its innovative original design, which incorporated the world's first tachymetre bezel, became the industry standard for high-performance chronographs, while its sturdy case and ultra-reliable movement earned it the approval of NASA, who made the Speedmaster standard issue for astronauts in the Apollo program. Just as NASA's scientists continue to explore ever further into the solar system, though, Omega's designers continue to refine the Speedmaster's capabilities and style in the 21st century. The new Omega Speedmaster Super Racing, with its advanced modern movement and distinctive look, is the latest chapter in this icon's ongoing evolution.

As suggested by its honeycomb dial and bold yellow accents, the Omega Speedmaster Super Racing is powered by the Co-Axial Master Chronometer 9920, which is the first movement ever to include Omega's Spirate System. Thanks to a new patent-pending spiral that allows for ultra-fine rate adjustments, this movement boasts an unprecedented precision of only 0/+2 seconds a day, making it the most accurate Speedmaster ever. This, in addition to sporty modern touches like bright yellow Super-LumiNova lume, makes the Speedmaster as much of a cutting-edge instrument in the 21st century as it was in the 20th.

The Constellation has been an integral part of Omega's lineup since the 1950s, and its expressive design has earned it a longstanding reputation as a stylish accessory for both women and men. A new 36 mm collection, however, reinterprets its design for contemporary tastes with a trio of colourful new dials and a decidedly feminine aesthetic. Among the Constellation's trademarks is a set of "claws" that cling dramatically to the bezel, and the new collection builds on this distinctive feature with a circle of 38 diamonds that glitter against its polished bezel and complement its diamond hour markers. Previous versions of the Constellation have featured Omega's famous mono-rang bracelet, but these versions strike a softer note with alligator leather straps in the same shades of blue, burgundy, and brown as their sun-brushed dials.

In addition to these updates, the Constellation upholds Omega's reputation for ultra-accurate movements with its Co-Axial Master Chronometer Calibre 8800, which is visible through the sapphire crystal case back. Like the chronometer-certified movement in the Speedmaster Super Racing, it has been tested to ensure not just superior precision but exceptional anti-magnetism, water resistance, and durability as well. These horological advancements reflect how Omega strives to improve upon all aspects of its timepieces, inside and out, and upholds its reputation as one of the world's top watchmakers through constant innovation. As these new models prove, even the most timeless designs are never truly finished.



## BELOVED OBJECTS

The simple formula behind CARTIER's timeless creations













The Cartier Tank is among the most recognizable watch designs of all time and has been worn by some of the most stylish people in the world over the last 100-plus years. Its design, however, is an exercise in simplicity, with a square or rectangular case and a simple Roman numeral dial. The Tank, which was designed in 1917 and remains a pillar of Cartier's collection in 2023, reveals how Cartier's creations are designed to stand the test of time.

Each of Cartier's designs draws its timeless appeal from four main principles. The first principle, concerning the purity of lines, aims to distill a piece down to its essential elements and create a form that's both easy to read and instantly understandable. There's no better illustration of this principle than the Tank, whose form consists of just two sets of parallel lines connected to a strap or bracelet.

Accuracy of shapes is another key principle – one concerned with using symmetry, parallelism, and asymmetry to underscore the aesthetic power of circles, squares, and other common shapes. While the Tank reveals the beauty found in a rectangle's hard corners, the Ballon Bleu watch, introduced in 2008, is a meditation on the softness of the circle. Composed of a series of concentric circles, the Ballon Bleu's design places its sapphire-capped crown under a metal hoop, a detail that protects the blue bubble while preserving the purity of its overall shape.

The third principle focuses on proportions and the balance between line and shape that gives Cartier pieces an overall harmonious appearance. The Cartier Panthère watch, created in 1983, exemplifies how these disparate elements can work together to create a cohesive whole. Named for the panther, a recurring motif in Cartier creations for more than a century, the watch features a square case with rounded angles paired with a bracelet of rounded rectangular links. This contrast of soft and hard lines and rounded and squared shapes makes the bracelet and the case perfect complements to each other while evoking the strength and litheness of the watch's namesake feline.

The final touch – precious details – is anything but an afterthought. Beauty can be found in all kinds of details, but at Cartier, they must be meaningful and functional, rather than for their own sake. A particularly elegant example can be found in the bezel of the Santos de Cartier watch, which is held in place by eight miniature screws. An evolution of the original Santos-Dumont watch, whose riveted bezel was itself an homage to the Eiffel Tower, these screws give the watch a distinctly modern look while serving an important role in its overall design. It's a radically simple idea executed with rare elegance, which, as Cartier has proven time and again in its watches, is the formula for a truly timeless object.

Time is an important element of every piece of music, but perhaps none more so than *Timeless*, an original symphony commissioned by Jaeger-LeCoultre and written by British musician Tokio Myers. Featuring piano accompanied by a wide variety of electronic sounds, the work is part of Made of Makers, a series of collaborations with artists, designers, and craftsmen that expands the dialogue between horology and art. An up-and-coming musician who rose to fame following his winning appearance on *Britain's Got Talent* in 2017, Myers – like each of the creators taking part in Made of Makers – embodies the unique balance of timelessness and modernity that defines Jaeger-LeCoultre's luxurious creations

To create *Timeless*, Myers drew inspiration from two main sources: a visit to the Jaeger-LeCoultre Manufacture in Le Sentier, and the mystical number behind some of humankind's most beautiful creations – the golden ratio. Expressed as the Greek letter Phi or the number 1.618, the golden ratio has fascinated great thinkers from Pythagoras to Le Corbusier and appears in many of humankind's most celebrated creations, from the compositions of Erik Satie and Debussy to *The Last Supper*. Among its many influential appearances in the modern world, the golden ratio can also be found in the sleek rectangular proportions of the Jaeger-LeCoultre Reverso.

"Being in Le Sentier, seeing first-hand how Jaeger-LeCoultre operates, experiencing the atmosphere in the Manufacture, seeing all the

skills, hearing all of the different sounds, enjoying the calm surroundings of the Vallée de Joux – that gave me a lot of inspiration to draw on," says Myers, explaining his creative process.

Timeless, which premiered earlier this year at the Shanghai International Film Festival, with additional performances in Los Angeles, London, and Dubai, was staged in Jaeger-LeCoultre's 1931 Cinema, a specially designed performance space inspired by the world's first drive-in movie theatre, which – like the Reverso – was created at the height of the Art Deco period. Each performance of Timeless features Myers playing the piano in front of a projection of falling water on a giant screen and tells the story of the golden ratio in four chapters – spanning its presence in nature, the scientific quest to unlock its mystical properties, its ubiquity in architecture and art through the ages, and its indelible impact on contemporary designs like the Reverso. The piece – which is played at a tempo of 161.8 beats per minute – is designed to take the listener on a powerful journey through art and time.

"Music has never been static; it's in constant evolution," Myers says. "For me, it starts with mastery of the basics, then breaking free from the norms and composing my own story – constantly searching for the balance between the voices of the past and my own. Composing for Jaeger-LeCoultre was so natural for me because we're looking for the same thing; there's a common goal," he says. "To reinvent the classic and find what is universal and timeless."

## FORM AND FUNCTION

The PATEK PHILIPPE Calatrava Ref. 6119 and the birth of modern design



The new Patek Philippe Calatrava Ref. 6119, available in white gold or rose gold, bears the hallmarks of modern design as expressed by the famed Bauhaus school.

"An object is defined by its nature," wrote the German architect Walter Gropious in the Bauhaus school's 1919 manifesto. "It must serve its purpose perfectly; it must fulfill its function usefully, be durable, economical, and 'beautiful." This revolutionary idea, along with a commitment to simplicity, honest use of materials, and continuous innovation, was the guiding philosophy of the famed German design school and has informed some of some of the most timeless designs of the last century, from the graceful lines of Marcel Breuer's Wassily chair to the original iPod. Gropius, however, could have also been describing the new Patek Philippe Calatrava Ref. 6119. While an argument can be made for the Calatrava's economy it is designed and built to last for generations, after all - its clean lines, simple geometric shapes, and respect for materials are textbook Bauhaus.

The first Patek Philippe Calatrava, the Ref. 96, was released in 1932. As the first numbered reference in the brand's history, it reflected a desire to bring watchmaking into the modern era, and over the last century the Calatrava remained one of the most respected names in the independent Swiss watchmaker's lineup. The influence of Bauhaus can be found in the original Calatrava's basic form - a circular gold case containing a dial, a small seconds sub-dial, three hands, and 12 indices – as well as its artful use of materials and its cutting-edge (for the time) movement. Its case, which measures just 30.5 mm in diameter, might be small by modern standards, but the ultra-legible design of its dial, hands, and hour markings ensures this diminutive piece is nonetheless perfectly suited to its role as a daily timekeeper.

Many versions of the Calatrava have been created since, spanning a wide range of precious stones, officer-style cases, different bezels, designs for both men and women, and a variety of case sizes and movements. The new Ref. 6119 is among the latest of these, and it gently updates its forebear's distinctive look for the 21st century. With a 39 mm case available in 18K rose or white gold, a diamond-polished "Clous de Paris" hobnail bezel, and a slim profile of just 8.08 mm – perfect for slipping under a shirt cuff – its design remains as true to the principles of Bauhaus as the original. Even its movement, the new manually-wound calibre 30-255 PS, balances form and function with its combination of high-tech silicon components as well as surfaces subtly decorated with chamfered and polished edges and Geneva striping.

The principles laid out by Gropious and his colleagues when they founded the Bauhaus school were intended to create an entirely new way of thinking about the built world. Objects designed using their principles could, they envisioned, exist almost outside of time, adapting and evolving to suit changing tastes and new technologies while remaining true to their essential functions. The Patek Philippe Calatrava Ref. 6119, which remains as much of a quintessential dress watch in 2023 as it was in 1932, is a perfect example of how well this notion works in practice. This makes the Calatrava not just a versatile accessory and a future heirloom, but an important reminder that nothing is more powerful – or timeless – than a great idea.





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
